

# INFORMATION NEEDS AND SEEKING BEHAVIOUR OF CITIZENS IN REWA DIVISION

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**ABSTRACT:** - The present paper briefly reviews the information needs and seeking behavior of citizens, focus on purpose for which information is required and types of sources used.

## INTRODUCTION

Studying 'citizen' information needs can be a staggering task as the term 'citizen' covers practically every inhabitant of the city, state or nation. And it involves studying virtually every aspect of everyone's life. A number of separate studies have been conducted on the information needs and information seeking behavior of individual groups (Scientists' medical professionals, social scientists, legislators, managers, students at different levels, the disabled, ethnic minorities etc.) When an attempt is made at studying citizens' information needs – it becomes a study of all the individual groups put together. Thus it is no mean task. Categorization of citizens is also a very difficult exercise. Some ways of categorizing are the following:- Citizen can be divided according to the kind of activities. Which they are engaged in-professional, semi – professionals and non-professionals.

Professionals are those who have undergone training for a certain period of time in a specialized field. They possess a professional degree and usually practice their profession following professional ethics. Professional groups include lawyers, doctors, engineers, teachers, managers etc.

Semi-Professionals: this group includes any person who is actively engaged in some field or sport for pay on a part time basis. Semi-professional work has some features of professional work but requires less

knowledge, skill and judgment. Qualified midwives, pharmacists and semi-professional baseball players are some of the people included under this category.

Non-Professionals: Simply put, anybody who is not included under the first two categories can be considered a non-professional. Uneducated housewives, religious leaders (some may hold professional degrees), manual labourers etc. Can all be included under this category.

## INFORMATION NEEDS OF CITIZENS

Information needs are strongly influenced by the specific circumstances of people and the places in which they live.

The factors that affect the information needs and information seeking behavior of citizen are the following:-

1. Whether the source is within reach
2. Whether money will be involved – if so, how much money.
3. Whether time will be involved – if so, how much time.
4. Whether the source will have the answer to their problem
5. Whether they will understand what the source provides as answer

**THE ROLE OF LIBRARY**

Earlier studies indicate that citizens never considered the library as an important information source. People had a stereotyped and traditional information view of public libraries. While some agreed that library officials were helpful, others found the atmosphere in libraries too off-putting. Some citizens even went to the extent of saying that it would not affect them personally if the libraries closed down.

Over the years however, libraries seem to have taken note of users' complaints. Having tired of always being last one the list of sources preferred by users- the libraries seem to have finally woken up. Latest studies show libraries as being the most preferred sources among a number of sources. More and more people have begun using libraries and more and more are becoming members. Membership is particularly higher amongst the higher social classes and the better educated.

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
